

Message from your Pastor

HAVE A BEAUTIFUL CHRISTMAS EVERYONE!

I LOVE CHRISTMAS! ... the whole ramped up season, because from start to finish it is

FUL! It is so charged with beauty that it really has the power to jump start our spiritual lives and inspire in us the best of our humanity. I love the contemplative call of the Advent season. For those weeks we prepare and plan, and increase our care of others—we give more, we make more time for others, we love more, we do more to get ready for Christmas and make it happen—baking, buying, Christmas cards and church bazaars add to the excitement. Advent is a time we can all grow in prayerful waiting and longing as we get in touch with our need of God. Advent is beautiful because it is a Holy season of recalling those themes of darkness and light, fulfillment of prophecies, and longing for deliverance. The Magnificat of Mary is

announced, and innocence triumphs... "The mighty one has done great things for me and Holy is his name!" she sings. Holiness is always beautiful; and we are reminded to find what is holy in us and each other. It is, after all, in



community, and in our personal relationships, that we are most likely to engage our faith in the most meaningful ways. I love how we are often blessed by the poetry of fresh fallen snow that suggests goodness, purity, and new beginnings and that sets what is ugly to the side. Snow is really more beautiful than inconvenient; and it is always great when it snows and you don't have to go anywhere! Kind of makes you want a flavored coffee or hot chocolate; or to cuddle up under a blanket by the fire with a book. What is awesome about Christmas is how we are surrounded by the beauty of the season. It all helps to celebrate the gift of Jesus in such personal and joyful ways. Everywhere we are being surrounded by beauty: The art of Christmas cards, the decorated church Nave, the St. Thomas More Choir Christmas Concert and other events that gather us together, the beauty of gifts, tinsel and colourful Christmas wrapping, Nativity scenes, bows and boughs and Christmas Trees, with decorations and lightslots of lights!

Makes me think of the prophet Isaiah: "The people in darkness have seen a great light." There is so much about Christmas that resists the downward drag of any kind of darkness—spiritual, psychological, or physical—even beautiful colourful Poinsettias revolt against an otherwise dead looking time of year. There is much to help lift our spirits both personally and collectively. No wonder many of us can't help but be caught singing Christmas carols at random—sometimes out loud, or under our breath, or in our cheered-up hearts. The Russian writer Dostoevsky once said, "We will be saved by beauty"... so it is no surprise that as we celebrate our saviour, we surround that celebration with so much beauty! Another writer, Ferrucci, captures something of the spirit of this season when he wrote: "Beauty is a primary principle that touches all parts and functions of our being. It opens us to the world and brings harmony to our relations with others and with nature; it helps us reach out and touch the entire universe... The world is full of beauty, both hidden and manifest. It is enough to be open, look around, be like a child again. And if we will only give it a little attention, we will find it, we will enjoy it, we will be saved by beauty." So, what I would like to say is: May you have a BEAUTIFUL Christmas! May there be someone, something, some moment, which captures your heart and attention; and delivers you to a spiritual epiphany of deep gratitude. May this season of beauty increase your gratitude to God for all the gifts of your life, but especially for the gift of the one this beautiful season is all about. You can never truly say you have enjoyed Christmas until you can look up into the Father's face and tell him, with gratitude, you have received His Christmas gift—Jesus. May you deepen in your love and gratitude for the gift of Jesus and all he came to mean to us and what he wants to be for you. May every blessing of this beautiful season be yours to enjoy!

Welcome Home!

Have you ever wondered about the Catholic Faith? Were you baptized in the Church and then been away for awhile? If so, we are so excited to have you here at St. Thomas More Catholic Parish!

Our goal is to provide you with the help you need to understand the Catholic Church and her teachings. We invite you to join us in worship, prayer, and fellowship as you discover/rediscover the Catholic Faith!

How do I come home?

There are a number of ways to begin your journey:

- 1. Go to Mass. (Saturday 4:30pm; Sundays 8, 9:30, 11 & 12 noon) Do not worry if you do not remember what you are supposed to do at Mass. The important thing is that you are there. Showing up is the first step.
- 2. Ask a friend that practices their Catholic faith about their own experiences with the Catholic Church. That friend may prove quite helpful in accompanying you on your journey home.
- 3. Contact the parish office to set up an appointment (780 434 6313). This will allow you to spend some dedicated time discussing your specific situation, getting answers to your questions, and learning more about the Catholic Church.
- *If you are already baptized Catholic and maybe left the Church for a while, another great way to journey home is to once again experience the healing Sacrament of Confession. This will allow you to once again fully participate in the Mass, including receiving the Eucharist. Even if it's been a long time and you don't remember what to do, or you've explored other religions, there is nothing to fear. The priest will be glad to guide you through the sacrament of Reconciliation.

As a Catholic, how can I help a loved one return to the Catholic Church?

Whether you are reaching out to a lapsed Catholic or you're in contact with someone who has shown interest in becoming a Catholic, the first step is to pray for them. Ask for guidance as you discern having a conversation with them about the Catholic faith or if your feeling called, invite them to Mass so they can experience the beauty of the sacraments for themselves. If you need help or are looking for guidance, please don't hesitate to call the parish office (780 434 6313). We are here to help!



RCIA is also an opportunity for personal renewal for Catholics who would like to learn or relearn their Catholic faith. Would you like to journey with those enrolled in our RCIA process by accompanying a new Catholic Christian as a sponsor? NICODEMUS NIGHT

"Nicodemus Night" is an information session regarding the process to become Catholic. It is named after Nicodemus, the Pharisee who met Jesus, discreetly and privately, at night (see John 3:1-21). This information session is meant for individuals wanting to understand the RCIA process either for themselves or on behalf of someone else. The meeting is scheduled for <u>Sunday</u>, <u>September 21</u>, <u>2025 at 2 pm</u>. "Nicodemus Night" is an open meeting. No registration or commitment is required, but we will collect names and contact numbers to follow up with interested individuals. Those interested are encouraged to attend Nicodemus Night so their questions can be discussed.



Baptism

Baptism serves as the first sacrament received when entering the Catholic faith. Along with Confirmation and Eucharist, it is one of the three Sacraments of Initiation. Through Baptism, we receive an indelible spiritual mark, making us forever a part of the Body of Christ, the Church. The Catechism of the Catholic church teaches that "through Baptism we are freed from sin and reborn as sons and daughters of God, we become members of Christ, are incorporated into the Church, and made sharers in her mission." (CCC 1213). The Church welcomed over 150 children for Baptisms in 2024, and we look forward to continuing baptismal preparation classes in 2025. The first in-person class is scheduled on Saturday, January 18, from 10-11:30am. More dates and options for preparation are listed in the Baptism Requirements document on our website. First Reconciliation & First Eucharist

First Holy Communion is considered one of the holiest and most important occasions in a Roman Catholic person's life. It is the first time a person receives the Eucharist, which is the body, blood, soul, and divinity of Christ. Most Catholic children receive their First Holy Communion at the age of 7 or 8 years, which is considered the age of reason. Registration for First Reconciliation & First Eucharist is now open. Confirmation

Confirmation is necessary for the completion of baptismal grace, making the recipient "more perfectly bound to the Church and enriched with a special strength of the Holy Spirit" completing what was begun with Baptism(CCC 1285).

In the Archdiocese of Edmonton, most young people receive the sacrament when they are 11-12 years old or in Grades 6,7,8. Registration for Confirmation is now open.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation

The Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches that "those who approach the sacrament of Penance obtain pardon from God's mercy for the offense committed against him, and are, at the same time, reconciled with the Church which they have wounded by their sins." (CCC 1422).

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is known as one of the two Sacraments of Healing (along with the Anointing of the Sick).

Contact the parish office for confession times. Please keep in mind that regular confession times will sometimes be disrupted by school Masses or Octaves (Christmas and Easter).



The Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick

The sacrament of Anointing of the Sick is "given to those who are seriously ill by anointing them on the forehead and hands with duly blessed oil - pressed from olives or from other plants - saying, only once: 'Through this holy anointing may the Lord in his love and mercy help you with the grace of the Holy Spirit. May the Lord who frees you from sin save you and raise you up" (CCC 1513).

To receive this sacrament of healing:

- The Anointing of the Sick is a repeatable sacrament not intended only for those who are at the point of death. It is not necessary to delay this sacrament.
- Contact your St. Thomas More parish for more information on receiving the Anointing of the Sick or to make a referral for a loved one.
- Individuals who are hospitalized should reach out to the designated care department or nursing station to call for the on-call priest.



The Sacrament of Matrimony

The sacrament of Matrimony or Marriage is a covenant between a man and a women by which they "establish between themselves a partnership of the whole of life," and the purpose of marriage is "the good of the spouses and the procreation and education of offspring" (CCC1601).

Newly Engaged

- 1. Step one is to meet with the pastor
- 2. Contact the office to schedule an appointment at 780 434 6313
- 3. Give the church a minimum of 6 months notice

Married civilly or Common law or previously Married?

Complete the sacrament of marriage through convalidation (completing what is already begun). **Later Marriage Preparation** is available to help you. For more information please contact the parish office and ask to speak with Fr. Mark McGee.

REPORT ON SACRAMENTS—2024 / 2025

Through Sacramental Preparation, the work of Jesus Christ is being accomplished here at St. Thomas More Parish! The fulfilling desire of parents to receive the sacraments for their children is a joy to behold. The Church welcomed **over 150 BAPTISMS** in 2024. We have also welcomed 260 parents and God parents.

BAPTISM: We look forward to serving you with ongoing Baptismal Preparation classes in 2025—both "In Person" and "Online". Please watch the bulletin for course dates in 2025, plan ahead and call the parish office at (780) 434-6313 to register well in advance of an anticipated Baptismal Sunday (*Dates are Scheduled into 2026*). Please see the "Baptism Requirements Document" on our Parish web site which includes dates for baptismal preparation and Baptism Sundays.

Children may be baptized up to seven years old. After this age, children need to undergo an "accommodated" program and commit to join their sacramental cohort at the next opportunity (i.e. to then complete 1st Reconciliation/1st Eucharist or Confirmation depending on age.) Anyone 16 years of age or older seeking Baptism would normally participate in RCIA (Adult classes).

Baptism is truly the greatest gift you can give your child; and what follows is a journey that takes the child through the Sacraments of Reconciliation, Eucharist and Confirmation. It all begins in Baptism! Congratulations to all our families who have undertaken this great adventure of faith with their children!

FIRST RECONCILIATION & FIRST COMMUNION: At St. Thomas More, there are 3 cycles of 1st Reconciliation & 1st Eucharist preparation. The <u>1st Cycle of 1st Reconciliation</u> classes had 105 students who made their 1st Confessions on October 19th. <u>1st Eucharist for the 1st Cycle</u> was celebrated on the Feast of Christ the King, on November 24th.

The <u>2nd Cycle of Reconciliation</u> classes had 97 students who made their 1st Confessions on December 7th. <u>1st Eucharist for the 2nd Cycle</u> will be celebrated in the new year, on the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, February 2nd. Congratulations to all the young people who have achieved this important milestone in their journey of faith. The parish shares in your joy!

The last and 3rd Cycle of 1st Reconciliation/ 1st Eucharist for 2024/2025 begins with the Parent Information and Orientation Meeting on March 12, 2025, from 6-7 pm. Register online and register early to guarantee a space for your child. All classes are mandatory, so be sure you can attend all of them. Proof of Baptism is required.

CONFIRMATION: At St. Thomas More, there are 2 cycles of Confirmation preparation. **101** students & 12 adults were confirmed in the 1st Cycle on December 16. The Parent Information and Orientation Meeting for the 2nd Cycle is on Monday, March 10, 2025, at 6-7 pm. Register on line and register early to guarantee a space for your child. All classes are mandatory so be sure you can attend all of them. The child's Proof of Baptism is required. Sponsors must be practicing Catholics and require proof of their own Confirmation. At least one parent must attend with their child. Candidates for Confirmation must be turning at least 12 in Grade 6 or older and be mature enough to participate fully in this process.

Confirmation involves an extended review of the Catholic faith and involves **PASSPORTS** and **SERVICE PROJECTS** so there's lots to learn about! The Baptised person is sealed with the gift of the Holy Spirit and is strengthened for service to the Body of Christ. It marks the shift from the formation of the young to them taking ownership of their own faith. It is a sacrament of maturity and readiness to be a confident and competent witness. The parents in attendance often report enjoying the many topics discussed just as much as the youth and are learning right along with them!

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We stand at the threshold of an incredible new chapter for our community. As we prepare to bring to life a new parish, Divine Mercy, I invite each of you, our faith family, to fervently join in this mission. Divine Mercy Parish is not just about constructing a new building, but about living out our vocation to extend the reach of Christ's message and create a lasting legacy for generations to come.

The need is clear: our community here at St. Thomas More has grown to a point where a new parish is essential to meet the spiritual and sacramental needs of southwest Edmonton. From baptisms, confirmations and marriages, to pastoral services in the community, physical space, and even parking, **we have reached our capacity**. For example, we currently have the privilege of serving over a dozen Catholic schools, with our neighbors, Corpus Christi Parish supporting four schools, and Good Shepherd Parish serving six schools within their respective boundaries. While we are committed to joyfully serving to the best of our ability, continuing at our current capacity undoubtedly compromises our ability to effectively fulfill our mission as a Catholic Parish. Our new southwest expansion will enable us to better serve our faith community here at St. Thomas More, while presenting a special opportunity to carry forward the ministry of Christ.

Our vision is to establish a vibrant Catholic community that compliments St. Thomas More Parish. An extension of our mission and faith family here, Divine Mercy Parish will bring the Good News and serve the needs of rapidly growing southwest communities. Mark 28:19 instructs us to "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations". We are a people sent. It is not just our privilege to lead growth beyond our walls, but also a fundamental precept of our faith, as Catholics, to continue the great commission, and grow the Church's reach.

This project is not something for "others" to handle. It belongs to us. Just as St. Thomas More stands strong today thanks to the faith and sacrifices of those who came before us, those who may never have witnessed the thriving community we

Worship, Witness, and Service – these are the foundational pillars for our diocese, as identified by Archbishop Richard Smith in his pastoral letter Living in the Word.

What are the Pastoral Priorities?

Over the next three years, we will draw inspiration from Mary, our patroness, whose life exemplifies Worship, Witness, and Service. Guided by the Blessed Mother's life and vocation, our pastoral priorities are:

- **Formation for Eucharistic Worship:** We are a faith community that joyfully celebrates and better understands the Eucharist. **What have we started?** Relocating our tabernacle to the sanctuary, Word, Sacrifice, and Crucifix together, and establishing our existing chapel of repose as an adoration chapel, Lenten Mission with Archbishop Smith to preach on Eucharistic Worship on Tuesday March 18, 2025
- Formation for Confident Witness: We are a faith community that is confident in proclaiming the Great Commission to spread the Good News of the Gospel within our respective vocations, professions, and communities. What have we started? Several strong youth programs especially for primary school, junior, and senior high youth, as well as young adults and younger families, a capstone Summit Retreat for high school youth to the Rockies including a mountain-top mass with adoration, and liturgical ministries workshops, especially jr. server workshops.
- Formation for Service to Families and Marriage: We are a faith community that accompanies families, fully recognizing the centrality of marriage and family in God's plan. What have we started? A later marriage preparation course to assist couples achieve a sacramental marriage, a 10-week marriage enrichment course that completed this past Advent season, and a planned 1-day "Christ at the Center" marriage retreat on February 22nd.



A Jubilee Year is a significant moment in the life of the Church in which she celebrates a year of favour. Proclaimed every 25 years since the 13th century, the celebration of jubilee years typically includes pilgrimages, processions, celebrations of Mass, and an invitation to the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

In the Archdiocese of Edmonton, there will be a number of opportunities throughout the year to embark on the "Pilgrimage of Hope," including:

Solemn Opening of the Jubilee Year - Holy Mass at St. Joseph's Basilica. Sunday, December 29, 10:30 am. Celebrated by Archbishop Richard Smith. All are welcome!

National Shrine to the Canadian Martyrs Relics Tour. Wednesday,

January 22. Sacred Heart Church of the First Peoples (9:00am-12:00pm) and Corpus Christi Parish, Edmonton (2:00-8:00pm).

"I Believe..." A seven-part catechesis series on the Nicaean Creed, marking the 1700th Anniversary of the Council of Nicaea. Starts Thursday, February 13 with sessions in March, April, May, September, October, November. Presented in partnership with Newman Theological College and St. Joseph's College-University of Alberta.

Father Mark's 25th Anniversary of Priestly Ordination: A Witness to the Joy of the Sacrificial Life of a Priest

"Celebrating 25 years to the priesthood is no small thing. It is an invitation for Fr. Mark, and all of us, to pause and reflect on the great gift the priesthood is to the church.

Fr. Mark shared with me the other day: 'There is no priesthood without community – there are no orphans in the church.'

Every vocation, including a vocation to the priesthood, is a way of joining our heart, mind, soul and will to Jesus Christ who prayed to the Father from the Garden before his crucifixion: 'not my will, but your will be done.'

Fr. Mark shared with me that the words of Jesus, 'You did not choose me, but I chose you,' have a profound meaning for him.

St. Augustine reflects on the role of a priest called to be a faithful shepherd to the people he is called to serve. Typical of St. Augustine, he laments those shepherds who are not faithful to this task, but he concludes in one of these readings:

'Which shepherds are dead?

Those who seek what is theirs and not what is Christ's.

But will there be shepherds who seek what is Christ's and not what is theirs, and will they be found?

There will indeed be such shepherds, and they will indeed be found; they are not lacking, nor will they be lacking in the

future."


