

#### Our Resurrection (John 20:1-18)



## Easter Message from our Pastor



In these days of the Holy Triduum—Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and the Easter Vigil/Easter Sunday, we enter into a ritual recalling of the pivotal moments of Christ's Passion, Death and Resurrection. Through these holiest of days, we take our time to unpack the central mysteries of our faith. We enter into them, and let them enter into us. Together we give voice, song and ritual to these central mysteries. Natural symbols speak to our spiritual instincts and help make us more available to them—ashes, the smell of fresh palm branches, bread that recalls the last Supper—the Passover and Covenants of God converging in Jesus. There are contrasting moments of light and darkness. Water, fire, earth, rocks, oil of anointing, rising incense. There is so much that marks our journey to Easter Sunday.

Our hearts are held captive by the sights and sounds, smells and actions of these days: The washing of feet on Holy Thursday. The invitation to take up the towel and basin ourselves. On Holy Thursday, we celebrate the Mass of the Lord's supper—the Eucharist is given along with the ministerial priesthood. One does not exist without the other; and neither exists without being fully realized within the (bridal, sacramental) church. Jesus keeps His promise: "I will be with you always until the end of time."

On Good Friday we stand in collective awe of a God who takes on flesh and dies rejected, bloodied and alone on a cross. Holding vigil at the tomb of Christ in prayerful meditation, we feel the immense weight of Jesus' sacrifice and of that impossible/impassable stone. Perhaps Good Friday will be for many an emotional joining of our own experience of loneliness, darkness and suffering with Jesus on the cross. Let Him be the one who brings us into the grace of surrendering completely to God— emptied out to be filled with Christ. Love is stronger than death. No stone is large enough to hold it back.

At the Vigil, the darkness of the night is pierced by the light of the Easter fire and the air fills with the fragrance of incense as a sign of our prayers rising to heaven. The Christ candle reaches into every space—taper to taper, heart to heart. The chanting of the ancient Exultet, proclaims again that 'happy fault that gained for us so great a redeemer'. The night of vigil recalls the moments of salvation history. In our observance of this night, we are joined by countless churches all around the world. The Elect and Candidates have prepared and are ready for the Easter Sacraments. We are His church born of water and the Holy Spirit. The church is not just an institution that has sacraments, it is a sacrament that has institutions. The newly Baptized are welcomed into a great mystery. Their initiation is accomplished. They live already held by grace. Our love and prayers attend them in a special way as they have for many months.

We are invited to plunge the depths of Holy Week. Like Israel wandering in the desert for 40 years, hopefully our 40 days of Lent has helped us discover what it is to be God's chosen people— not only turning toward God, but away from all and any former ways of spiritual bondage. Like Israel, perhaps we have been learning a deeper faith, and un-learning the distractions of a secular culture. The Risen Lord comes to us this week – so that we, in turn, may be His presence to others. We are His suffering, yearning, confident and hope-filled body. Our love for God finds expression in our love for neighbor. It is one love. We are His Eucharistic people—blessed, broken and shared out to the hungry that "cross" our lives. Jesus makes His home in you and with you. You are the temple of His Holy Spirit in which the mystery of the Triduum will be celebrated and observed. Each of us is that sign where the story of salvation history shall be retold and reborn in convincing ways.

"Christ is risen—for you. He has overcome sin—for you. Take hold of these gifts by taking hold of Jesus. Then watch, as your heart is filled with joy." (The Word Among Us) Have a beautiful Easter! May the Power of the Resurrection lift your hearts and fill them with His life, His love, His peace, His hope, His joy and His courage. With Christ, we are undefeatable! God bless you all! Alleluia!


NEW PARISHIONERS: Welcome! We value your friendship and your dedication to the life of this parish. Registration clearly announces your arrival in the parish and enables us to communicate with you as soon as possible. Opening the lines of communication between parish and family is very important. Parish membership is essential before some sacraments may be administered. This is particularly true of Baptism, Confirmation, and Marriage. Registration is an effective initiation tool into the life of the parish and helps us to best serve your interests and that of your family. A "New Parishioner Welcome" happens usually twice a year.



SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM: Infant Group Baptisms are celebrated year-round, except during Advent and Lent. We accept Infant Baptism registrations from unborn baby to children under the age of 7 and Later Baptism registrations for children between the ages of 7 and 15, who would like to be baptized and receive all other ageappropriate sacraments. A Baptism Preparation program is required for both parents and godparents, and we offer both, in-person and online preparation options. Upcoming In-person preparation classes for Infants are on April 26, May 5 & 10. Baptisms will be celebrated on May 4, 25 (full), June 22, July 13 & 27. More dates for preparation and Baptism for 2025—2026 are available on our website in the Baptism Requirements document under Sacraments-Baptism. SACRAMENT OF First Reconciliation & First Eucharist: Most Catholic children receive their First Holy Communion when they are 7 or 8 years old, as this is considered the age of reason. Stay tuned for our Summer Intensive class!



SACRAMENT OF CONFIRMATION: In the Archdiocese of Edmonton, most young people receive the sacrament when they are 11-12 years old. Stay tuned for our Summer Intensive class!

SACRAMENT OF MARRIAGE: "Time to buy the ring!" Please give 6 months notice in booking your wedding date! Step one is to meet with the priest, even before booking a hall. Time is needed to accommodate the preparation of wedding documents and attending a Catholic Marriage Preparation program. St. Thomas More runs its program annually in mid-March. Watch for details. Other programs are available in the Diocese. If you are considering a non-Catholic wedding, please don't! Civil weddings or ones done by a non-Catholic minister of religion are not sacramentally valid. The logic is simple. Weddings outside the church often result in families outside the church. Catholics are obliged to be married in the presence of a priest, in the consecrated space of a church dedicated to the celebration of all sacraments. Being married by a random person in a random place does not represent the kind of intention one would hope to have on one of the most anticipated days of one's life. Consider prayerfully the dignity of this sacrament of love at the service of the gospel, that, as St. Paul says, is a symbol of the love of Christ for His bride, the Church. We welcome the opportunity to support you in your journey towards the joyful celebration of your marriage!



For later marriages: For those married civilly or in a common-law arrangement, please consider completing the Sacrament of Marriage by a process of Convalidation. A suitable later marriage preparation can be made available to you. We are happy to accommodate you.



RCIA: Adults (16+years old) seeking to become Catholic, please speak to Paul Givens. Enquirers are always welcome. Please drop by the Parish office or call (780) 434 6313. This is also an opportunity for renewal of Catholic Adults. Runs early September to Easter/Pentecost. Meets Thursday evenings 7 to 9 pm.
